For the Parents

Dear Parents,

I feel blessed to have the opportunity to work with your child this quarter. My prayer is that your child's learning will result in their having a closer relationship with God.

Unit I, "Jesus Gives Us Hope"—drawn from the books of Colossians (lesson 1), 2 Corinthians (lesson 2), Romans (lesson 3), Hebrews (lesson 4), and Acts (lesson 5) considers Christian hope through the lens of the early church. The mysteries of God made known to the early church, the working of the Holy Spirit in believers, and the spiritual lifeline to God through Christ all inspire Christian hope. The unit closes with Paul's testimony of Christian hope.

Unit II, "Praying with Hope," turns attention to the prayers of ancient Israel as a model for offering to God our praise and petitions. These Hebrew prayers are also expressions of Christian hope. The first lesson of the unit is from a song of lament in Lamentations 3, while the remaining lessons of Unit II are drawn from the Psalms.

Unit III, "Hope for the Future"—from the books of 1 Thessalonians, 1 John, and Titus—considers facets of the promised future that God is preparing for believers. Paul anticipates the nearness of Christ's return in 1 Thessalonians 3 (lesson 10); and in seeing Christ, we become more like Him (as found in 1 John—lesson 11) and, according to Titus 2 and 3, live out the present moment with hope (lessons 12 and 13).

You can have a discussion with your child about giving his or her life to God with help from the *ABCs of Salvation*, listed below.

- A. Say, "Admit you have sinned (see Psalm 32:5), or done wrong." Go through just a few of the Ten Commandments—stealing or lying and so forth. Tell how our sins separate us from God (see Isaiah 59:2 and Romans 3:23).
- B. Say, "Believe Jesus is God's Son. He took the punishment for our sins by dying on the cross (see Romans 5:8). We must believe that Jesus is God's Son and that God raised Him from the dead."
- C. Say, "Call on God to forgive you (see Acts 2:21). When we are sorry for our sins and want to stop doing wrong, we can ask God to forgive us (see Acts 16:31)."

Thank you for the opportunity to help shape your child's spiritual life.



Suffering for Your Sake

Paul wrote a letter to the Colossian believers. Paul was in jail when he wrote the letter. But Paul was happy and *rejoiced* (was joyful) while in jail. Paul did not mind suffering for the church. God chose Paul to serve the church and preach God's complete Word. God's complete Word was a mystery kept hidden for many years—but now it is available to all of God's people.

LESSON

Paul struggled for the Colossian believers and for others who had never met Paul personally. Paul's goal was for the believers to be encouraged and united in love for one another. Paul wanted them to have the riches

of understanding the mystery of God. This mystery is Jesus Christ, who gives hope to all believers. In Jesus lie all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge (see Colossians 2:3).

Paul did not want anyone to trick the believers with their

arguments. Paul was far away and in jail, but he was present with the believers in spirit. It made Paul happy to see how strong the believers' faith in Jesus was.



Believers are living letters for God!

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

Friends Build Up


Paul wrote a letter to the believers (Christians) in Rome. Paul reminded the believers who have strong *faith* (trust in God) to help those with weak faith. Believers with strong faith must not please themselves. After all, Jesus Christ did not please Himself. Believers with strong faith must be *considerate* of (think about) their neighbors. They must help to build up their neighbors by encouraging, teaching, and praying for them—cheering them on. This helps to make their faith strong.

LESSON

The Word of God teaches all believers. It provides encouragement and hope as believers wait for God's promises. God gives believers the

attitude of Jesus Christ. This Christlike attitude helps believers live in harmony and peace with each other. Then believers can join with one mind and one voice in praise and glory to God, the Father of Jesus Christ. So, believers must accept each other just as Jesus Christ accepted all.

Paul prayed that the God of hope would fill the believers with joy and peace. Paul wanted the believers to overflow with hope through the power of God's Spirit.




Lesson Scripture: Romans 15:1-7, 13
