I feel blessed to have the opportunity to work with your child this quarter. My prayer is that your child's learning will result in their having a closer relationship with God.

Unit I, "Ancient Altars and Offerings," has five lessons from the book of Genesis. Lesson 1 examines Cain's and Abel's offerings. Lesson 2 focuses on Noah—as he stepped onto dry land, built an altar, and gave offerings to God. Lesson 3 relates to Abraham's most significant test of faith. Lessons 4 and 5 present Isaac and Jacob as they built altars and worshipped God.

Unit II, "Jesus Teaches about God's House," explores texts from the Gospels. Lesson 6 (Luke 2) recounts Jesus at age 12, amazing the teachers at the Temple. Lesson 7 (Matthew 12) expounds on the criticism that Jesus and the disciples received for violating the Sabbath. Lesson 8 (John 2) explores John's account of Jesus' cleansing of the Temple. Lesson 9 (Matthew 24) records Jesus' prediction that the Temple would one day be destroyed.

Unit III, "God Lives in Me"—from the books of 1 Corinthians, Ephesians, Hebrews, and 1 Peter—explores what it means to offer new covenant sacrifices. Lesson 10 explains how Christians serve as the temple of the Holy Spirit. Lesson 11 challenges believers to be "living sacrifices." In lesson 12, Paul teaches that God has one temple, which includes Jews and Gentiles. In lesson 13, believers are challenged to make sacrifices of praise and good works. Lesson 14 examines how each believer is a "living stone."

You can have a discussion with your child about giving his or her life to God with help from the *ABCs of Salvation*, listed below.

- A. Say, "Admit you have sinned (see Psalm 32:5), or done wrong." Go through just a few of the Ten Commandments—stealing or lying and so forth. Tell how our sins separate us from God (see Isaiah 59:2 and Romans 3:23).
- B. Say, "Believe Jesus is God's Son. He took the punishment for our sins by dying on the cross (see Romans 5:8). We must believe that Jesus is God's Son and that God raised Him from the dead."
- C. Say, "Call on God to forgive you (see Acts 2:21). When we are sorry for our sins and want to stop doing wrong, we can ask God to forgive us (see Acts 16:31)."

Thank you for the opportunity to help shape your child's spiritual life.

LESSON

done what was right. But Cain refused to do what was right. The Lord told Cain that sin was near and eager to take control of him. The Lord warned Cain and told him that he must conquer [con-ker] (win over) and rule over sin (wrongdoing) and not let it control him.

LESSON

Trusting when It Is Hard

LESSON

God tested Abraham's *faith* (belief and trust) and told Abraham to take his son Isaac to the land of Moriah and sacrifice him as a burnt offering.

Abraham got up early. He took two servants and Isaac. After chopping wood for the fire for the burnt offering, he traveled to the place where God told him to go.

Abraham put the wood for the burnt offering on Isaac's shoulders. Abraham carried the knife. Isaac asked where the sheep for the burnt offering was.

Abraham told Isaac that God would provide the sheep for the burnt offering.

At their destination, Abraham built an altar

and put wood on it. He tied Isaac and laid him on the altar on top of the wood. When Abraham prepared to sacrifice his son, the Lord stopped him because Abraham had shown his complete faith in the Lord.


